Skimming is an important skill that allows us to read text quickly to get the basic overall idea. We can use skimming to get a quick overview, so that we can decide if we want to read a section in detail.

B. Main Text



Nemo and Dory. Woody and Buzz. Wall-E and Eve. Mike and Sullivan. If any of these names ring a bell, then you have probably seen a Pixar movie before. Over roughly the last 25 years, millions of people around the world have been dazzled by Pixar studio's creations. Pixar is known for using cutting-edge technology, original storylines and compelling characters to tell memorable stories. Although American animation has traditionally been aimed at children, Pixar has broken that mold, releasing thought-provoking animated movies that can be enjoyed by audiences of all ages.

ring a bell: sound familiar

Based in Northern California, Pixar began its life as a company that specialized in computer-generated imagery (CGI) hardware. At this time,

back in 1979, Pixar was owned by George Lucas' studio "Lucasfilm". George Lucas had shot to fame with his blockbuster Star Wars, and was known for using state-of-the-art effects in his movies. For the next seven years, the Pixar team worked on many movies and achieved various technological milestones in the industry. In 1986, Steve Jobs, head of Apple at that time, purchased Pixar and the studio began to produce its own computer-animated commercials for other companies.

Yet these were troubled times for Pixar. In 1990, due to poor sales of Apple computers, Apple sold its hardware division and had to <u>lay off</u> many of its employees. The company was losing money, and Jobs was <u>contemplating</u>

selling it. Instead of selling the ailing company however, Jobs took over as CEO and invested more money into Pixar. Despite Pixar's troubles, Disney saw some potential, and made a three-movie production deal with the studio, the first of which was Toy Story.

Released by Disney in 1995, *Toy Story* was the first <u>feature-length</u> computer-animated movie, and the first movie made by Pixar. The story tells the tale of a pull-string cowboy doll named Woody, who is a leader of a group toys that come to life when unattended. Woody must overcome his jealousy of a new toy, Buzz, introducing a theme of self-improvement that is repeated throughout all of Pixar's movies. A commercial triumph, Toy Story was the topgrossing film on its opening weekend and went on to earn over 350 million worldwide.

In addition, *Toy Story* was a critical success. Critics praised it for not only its technical innovations, but also its intelligent and witty story. It was nominated for numerous awards, including three Academy Awards, winning the Oscar for Special Achievement. To this day, many critics acknowledge *Toy Story* as one of the best animated movies of all time. It has spawned two sequels (*Toy Story* 2 and 3) and a variety of spin-offs, such as television shows, toys, games and theme park attractions.

After Toy Story, Pixar established a pattern of producing movies that were technically innovative in the field of animation. A Bug's Life (1998), used a new technology that made animation more lifelike. Monsters Inc (2001) tackled the problem of making fur appear real in its appearance and movement. For Finding Nemo (2003), Pixar animators took a crash course in fish biology, visiting aquariums, attending lectures and even diving in Hawaii, in order to create a realistic ocean world. The Incredibles (2004) faced the challenge of making human faces that were capable of realistic expressions and Ratatouille (2007) created computer-generated food that appeared delicious.

Pixar's movies continued to be critical and commercial successes, too. Finding Nemo sold over 40 million copies in three years, thus making it one of the best-selling DVDs of all time. This once again got the attention of Disney, who in 2007 purchased Pixar for \$7.4 billion. Since then Pixar movies have continued to be profitable, earning Disney over \$8 billion dollars. Furthermore, Toy Story 3 (2010) is the highest-grossing animated movie of all time, raking in over a billion dollars worldwide.

Following a trend set by *Toy Story*, most of Pixar's movies have been met with critical praise. On Metacritic, a website that aggregates critics' reviews, Ratatouille, Wall-E (2008), The Toy Story trilogy, Finding Nemo, The Incredibles and Up (2009) have all scores of more than 85 out of 100. Pixar movies have also won a variety of awards, including 27 Academy Awards, seven Golden Globes and eleven Grammy Awards.

touch. Some say that this is because Pixar is no longer as creative as it used to be. Cars 2 and Monsters University, a sequel and a prequel respectively, both take place in worlds already familiar to audiences. Many people blame Disney for this, saying that these movies are just examples of Disney cashing in on already successful formulas.

Disney has also been criticized for its treatment of Merida, the main character of Pixar's *Brave* (2012). In the movie, Merida is portrayed as a strong, tom-boyish girl with curly red-hair, who cares little about her appearance. In May 2013, Disney released a redesign of Merida in preparation for her coronation as Disney's 11th princess. The redesign included a slimmer waist, larger bust, nicer hair and a sparkling dress. Critics complained that the makeover turned Merida into just another princess, and sent a message to girls that the new, more attractive Merida was superior. A week later a petition to change Merida back had over 200,000 signatures and Disney backed down, restoring her to her original self.

In 2013, Pixar announced it's next project, *Finding Dory*, a sequel to the much-loved Finding Nemo. No doubt this movie will be huge hit at the box office. However, will it be as critically successful as some of the earlier Pixar movies? Many say that Pixar still has some magic left in it. What do you think?

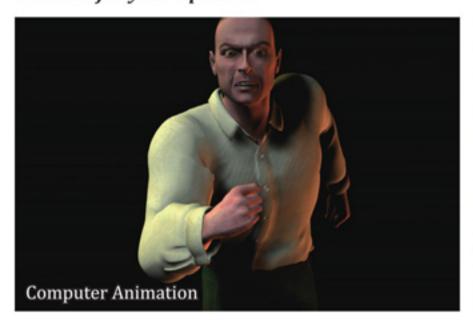
