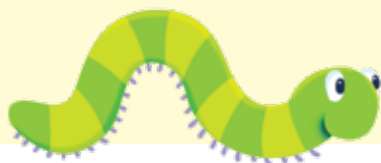

an one; any; each; every. We use **an** before words that begin with the vowel sounds of **a**, **e**, **i**, **o**, and **u**.
I ate an apple an hour ago.

and **a**. with; together with; besides.
She likes to sing and dance.

b. added to. *In math, 4 and 5 are 9.*

ant a small insect that lives in the ground or in wood. *An ant lives and works in a group.*

ape an animal like a monkey except it has long arms and no tail. *An ape can walk on two feet.*

are the form of the verb **be** used with **you**, **we**, and **they**. *You are next. They are last.*

at in or by a place or thing. *Chang is at school.*

B

back the part of the body on the other side from the chest. *Give her a pat on the back.*

bad (**worse**, **worst**; **bad•ly**) not good, right, or healthy. *Eating too much is bad for you.*

bag a sack; a container made of soft material. *Scott will take the bag with food in it.*

bake (**bakes**, **baked**, **bak•ing**) to cook in an oven. *We bake bread.*

bath a washing of the whole body. *We gave our dog a bath.*

be (am, are, is, was, were, been, be•ing) **a.** to equal. *Anna answered, "2 and 3 are 5."* **b.** to happen. *What time will the game be?*

bed a thing to sleep or rest on. *Meg can make her bed.*



bed

beet a plant grown for its juicy root. *He ate the red beet.*

bend (bends, bent, bend•ing) **a.** to make something curve. *Help me bend this wire.* **b.** to stoop or lean over. *Can you bend and touch your toes?*

best better than all others. *That was the best lunch I ever had.*

bib a cloth tied under a baby's chin to keep his or her clothing clean. *The baby's bib was full of food.*

big large. *Our school is big.*

bike a bicycle. *Juan rides his bike.*

bit past tense of **bite**. *He bit into the apple.*

bite (bites, bit, bit•ten or bit, bit•ing) to grab, hold, or cut with the teeth. *When I lost my front teeth, it was hard to bite.*

bod•y (bod•ies pl.) all the parts that make up a person or an animal. *Take good care of your body.*

bone a hard part inside the body; a part of the skeleton. *Your longest bone is in your leg.*

booth **a.** a stand where something is sold. *Our class ran an art booth at the school fair.* **b.** a closed place. *Use the phone in that booth.*

box (box•es pl.) a case to hold things. *I have a toy box.*

broom a brush with a long handle, used for sweeping. *You can use the broom to sweep the walk.*

bud the small beginning of a flower or leaf. *That bud will be a rose.*

bug (bugs pl.) an insect, usually one that crawls. *Even a small bug can crawl fast.*

bump **a.** to knock or hit against something. *Try not to bump into the wall.* **b.** a raised place. *The bump in the road makes the car bounce.*

cards

bus (bus•es pl.) a long car or van that can carry many people. *We ride a bus to school.*

but **a.** yet; however. *I will come, but I want to eat lunch first.* **b.** except. *We can go any day but Monday.*



came past tense of **come**. *They came to see us last week.*

can (could) **a.** to know how or to be able to. *He can play the piano.* **b.** a metal container. *Here is a can of peas.*

cards small pieces of stiff paper. *We wrote the letters on separate cards.*

cat (cats pl.) **a.** a small furry animal that can purr. *Our cat loves to sit on my lap.* **b.** any larger animal that is also a part of the cat family. *A lion is a cat.*

cheek the side of the face below the eye. *She had a little smudge on her cheek.*

chips small pieces broken or cut off something. *Glue these chips back onto the cup.*

cluck a sound made by a chicken. *When a hen calls her chicks, it sounds like "cluck, cluck."*

cod a big fish often used for food. *Cod live in cold water.*

code a set of signals for sending messages. *Our club made up a secret code.*

come (comes, came, come, com•ing)
a. to move closer; arrive. *Come over to my house.* **b.** to happen. *Our birthdays come once a year.*

cone **a.** an object that is round at one end and pointed at the other. *She made a cone of paper.* **b.** the seed pod of an evergreen tree. *That pine cone grew on a white pine tree.*

crack (cracks, cracked, crack•ing)
a. to break or split without snapping apart. *The glass may crack when I wash it.* **b.** to make a sudden snapping noise. *Did you hear the thunder crack?*

crash the very loud noise of something falling, breaking, or hitting. *The tree fell with a loud crash.*

creek a small stream. *The ducks swim in the creek.*

cub a young bear, lion, or wolf. *We saw a bear cub at the zoo.*

cut (*cuts, cut, cut•ing*) to split with something sharp. *Let's cut this apple in half.*

dad a short word for **father**. *My dad took us for a walk.*

date the time when something happens. *July 4 is an important date.*

dive

deed an act; a thing done. *Helping Jill clean her room was a good deed.*

deep far down or back. *Big fish swim in deep water.*

den **a.** the home of a wild animal. *The lion cubs stay near their den.*

b. a small room where one can read, relax, or work. *Mother is watching TV in the den.*

did past tense of **do**. *I did my homework last night.*

dig (*digs, dug, dig•ing*) to make a hole in the ground. *Dogs dig holes with their front paws.*

dish (*dish•es pl.*) **a.** something that holds food. *Put the dish on the table.*

b. to serve food. *Mom will dish out the green beans.*

dive (*dives, dived or dove, div•ing*) to jump headfirst into water. *Seals dive to catch fish.*

do (does, did, done, do•ing) to act, make, perform, or carry out. *Everyone in the class will do something different.*

dome a round roof or cover. *Dad put the cheese under a glass dome.*

dot **a.** a small round spot. *There was a dot of ink on my new shirt.* **b.** to mark with a small round spot. *Be sure to dot that i.*

duck a swimming bird with webbed feet, a short neck, and a flat bill. *The duck swam in the pond.*

dug past tense of **dig**. *Dan dug a deep hole.*

E

easy not hard to get or do. *A toy on wheels is easy to pull.*

F

fast able to act or move quickly. *We can run fast.*

fed past tense of **feed**. *I fed the dog.*

feed (feeds, fed, feed•ing) to give food to. *We must feed the horses.*

feel (feels, felt, feel•ing) **a.** to touch. *Feel the soft fur of the cat.* **b.** to have the feeling of being. *I feel cold.* **c.** to have an emotion. *I feel sad.*

feet the parts of the body at the end of the legs. *I can stand on two feet.*

fix (fix•es, fixed, fix•ing) to repair or mend. *Grandpa can fix that broken toy.*

fox (fox•es pl.) a wild animal like a dog but with a bushy tail. *The fox ran into the forest.*

frog a small animal with webbed feet that lives near water. *A frog can jump far.*

fun a good time; happy play. *We had fun at the zoo.*



game **a.** a way to play that follows rules. *Let's have a game of tag.*
b. the things needed to play a game. *Where is your game of checkers?*

gate an opening like a door in a fence or wall. *She closed the garden gate.*

gave past tense of **give**. *We gave Mr. Russo a flower.*

get (gets, got, got or got•ten, get•ting) **a.** to come to have; to receive. *Our class will get new desks.* **b.** to bring. *I will get you a glass of milk.*

give (gives, gave, giv•en, giv•ing) to hand over; to let have. *I will give you this ball.*

go (goes, went, gone, go•ing) to move. *Let's go to your house to play.*

goes past tense of **go**. *This car goes fast.*

got past tense of **get**. *She got some carrots for a snack.*

grab (grabs, grabbed, grab•ing) to take hold of suddenly. *The boys grab their coats and run for the bus.*

grin (grins, grinned, grin•ing) to smile broadly. *The teacher may grin at my joke.*

had past tense of **have**. *We had fun at the park.*

has a form of **have**. *She has a sunny smile.*

hat a covering for the head; a cap. *My hat keeps my ears warm.*



hat

have (has, had, hav•ing) to own; to possess. *I have a red cap.*

he that boy or man. *He is a good boy.*

hen a female chicken or other bird. *Your hen can lay eggs.*

hide (hides, hid, hid•den or hid, hid•ing) to put or keep out of sight. *Let's hide the gifts quickly.*

hike a. a long walk. *We took a hike in the woods.* b. (hikes, hiked, hik•ing) to take a long walk. *Let's hike up that hill.*

him that boy or man. *Mike looked hungry, so I gave him an apple.*

his belonging to a boy or a man. *Ted likes to play with his dog.*

hive a box or other place where bees live. *Can you see any honey in the hive?*

hog a full-grown pig. *The hog eats lots of corn.*

hole an opening or empty space. *A nail makes a hole in the wall.*

home the place where a person lives. *My home is an apartment.*

hop (hops, hopped, hop•ing) to move by jumping lightly. *Rabbits hop quickly.*

hope (hopes, hoped, hop•ing) to wish or expect. *I hope you will visit us soon.*

hose a rubber or plastic tube that carries water. *Mom used the hose to water the garden.*

hot very warm; having a high temperature. *The stove is hot.*

hug (hugs, hugged, hug•ing) to put the arms around something. *I hug my brother.*

hum (hums, hummed, hum•ing) to sing with the lips closed. *All day she liked to hum the new song.*

hush (hush•es, hushed, hush•ing) to make still or quiet. *See if you can hush the baby.*

hut a little house or cabin that is plain and simple. *We camped in huts.*



I me; myself; the person talking. *I am learning to spell.*

if **a.** whether. *Do you know if Carmen is coming?* **b.** though. *Even if it rains, we'll still go.*

in **a.** inside. *We live in town.* **b.** during. *It rained in the morning.*

is a form of **be**. *Kevin is tall.*

it that thing. *It is my book.*

jet a kind of plane with a strong engine. *The big jet took off with a loud roar.*

job the work that one does. *Taking out the trash is my job.*

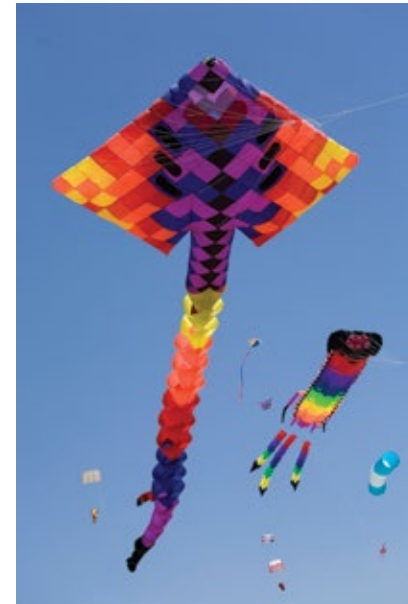
jog (jogs, jogged, jog•ing) to run at a slow, steady pace. *Mrs. Morgan likes to jog every day to keep fit.*

jot (jots, jot•ed, jot•ing) to write something quickly. *Jot down this name on your list.*

keep (keeps, kept, keep•ing) **a.** to hold on to; to save. *Kim wants to keep all her old schoolwork.* **b.** to let stay; to have. *Todd can keep his socks in the top drawer.*

kite a paper or cloth toy that can fly in the air on the end of a long string. *My kite is red.*

lake an inland body of water. *We saw a sailboat on the lake.*

lamp an object that gives light. *Turn on the lamp.*

lap the top part of a person's legs when sitting down. *Dad held the baby on his lap.*

lead (leads, led, lead•ing) to show the way; to take. *Will you please lead the dog back home?*

led past tense of **lead**. *We led the horse to the barn.*

leg the part of the body used for standing and walking. *We put our pants on one leg at a time.*

let (lets, let, let•ing) to allow; to permit. *Please let me go to the park.*

lid a top or cover. *He put the lid back on the pan.*

life being alive. *We study the life of plants.*

like **a.** the same as; similar to. *Marie is like a sister to me.* **b.** (likes, liked, lik•ing) to enjoy. *I like the new family next door.*

line **a.** a long thin mark. *Draw a line on the paper.* **b.** a row of persons or things. *We stood in a line.*

made past tense of **make**. *We made lunch on Monday.*

make (makes, made, mak•ing)

a. to put together; to build, form, or shape. *Dad can make a great pie.*

b. to cause. *Singing can make me feel happy.*

man (men pl.) an adult male person. *Mr. Green is a nice man.*

mane the long hair that grows on the back of the neck of a lion or horse. *A lion's mane makes him look important.*

mat a piece of fabric or woven straw; a small rug. *Wipe your feet on the mat near the door.*

me I; myself; the person talking. *Eric will go with Ann and me.*

meet (meets, met, meet•ing) to come face to face with; to come together. *I'll meet you down at the corner.*

men more than one man. *We watched the men working.*

mend (mends, mend•ed, mend•ing) to repair; to fix. *Can you mend the hole in the roof?*

mess a dirty or sloppy state of things. *My room was a mess before I cleaned it.*

met past tense of meet. *We met the new girl.*

mine belonging to me. *This box is mine.*

mix (mix•es, mixed, mix•ing) to put different things together. *I will mix nuts and raisins to make a snack.*

mole a small animal with smooth fur and small eyes that lives underground. *A mole has long claws.*

mom a short word for **mother**.
My mom has a good job.

moon the body that shines in the night sky. *A full moon looks like a big circle.*

mop **a.** a long-handled tool used to clean floors. *This mop has a sponge on one end.* **b. (mops, mopped, mop•ping)** to wipe with a mop or cloth. *Please mop up the water.*

mow•ing form of **mow**. cutting the grass. *She is mowing the lawn this morning.*

must to have to. *You must come home at six.*

name **a.** a word or words to call a person, place, or thing. *His name is Ryan.* **b. (names, named, nam•ing)** to give a name to; to call. *They will name the boy after his grandfather.*

neck the part of the body that joins the head to the shoulders. *A giraffe has a very long neck.*

net a fabric with small holes. *He can catch a fish in his net.*

no **a.** the opposite of **yes**. *I voted "no" in a loud voice.* **b.** not any. *The dog had no food until we got home.*

nose the part of the face just above the mouth. *You smell with your nose.*

not a word that says **no**. *It is not a sunny day.*

note **a.** a very short message or letter. *Let's write Mom a note.* **b.** a sign in music. *That is a quarter note.*

nut a dry fruit or seed with a hard shell. *I ate one nut.*

of **a.** belonging to. *The roof of the house is brown.* **b.** made from. *The birds live in a nest of twigs.*

on **a.** above and held up by. *The lamp is on the table.* **b.** about. *I have a book on kites.* **c.** in use; not off. *She turned the radio on.*

on•ly **a.** single; by itself. *This is my only shirt with stripes.* **b.** no more than; just. *We have only one hour to get ready.*

ox (**ox•en pl.**) a heavy bull used as a work animal. *The ox can pull a cart.*



pack **a.** (**packs, packed, pack•ing**) to put carefully in a box or trunk. *Help me pack my suitcase.* **b.** a soft bag carried on the back. *My pack is heavy.*

pan a container used for cooking. *Use a small pan to heat the soup.*

pants a piece of clothing that covers each leg separately. *I wear pants.*

path a narrow trail or track. *The path leads up the hill.*

peek (**peeks, peeked, peek•ing**) to take a quick look. *Close your eyes and don't peek.*

peel (**peels, peeled, peel•ing**) to take off the skin or outer layer. *We will peel the orange.*

pen **a.** a tool used for writing in ink. *My pen has blue ink.* **b.** a closed place to keep animals. *That pig lives in a pen.*

pet an animal kept with people. *A cat may make a good pet.*

pick (**picks, picked, pick•ing**) **a.** to choose. *Which poem did you pick to read?* **b.** to pull off. *We can pick cherries from the tree.*

pig (**pigs pl.**) a short animal with a thick body and a flat nose. *Our pig likes to dig.*

pin **a.** a thin piece of metal with a sharp point. *A pin can hold things together.* **b.** a small piece of jewelry with a sharp point. *Grandmother wore a pretty pin on her dress.*

pine an evergreen tree with leaves like needles. *We found a lot of cones under the tall pine.*

pumps

plum a small, soft, juicy fruit. *He picked a wild plum.*

pole a long thin piece of wood or metal. *We hung the flag from a pole.*

pop (**pops, popped, pop•ping**) to make a short, loud sound. *Did you hear the balloon pop?*

post a wooden or metal pole. *Ted will paint the post.*

pot a deep, round dish or pan. *A pot is used for cooking.*

pumps makes something flow from one place to another. *Mom pumps the gas into our car.*

pup a young dog; a puppy. *The happy pup wagged his tail.*

push (push•es, pushed, push•ing)

a. to press on something to move it. *Push the gate shut.* **b.** to shove. *Try not to push the people in front of you.*



quack the sound made by a duck.

We heard the quack of the wild duck as it flew south.



rake **a.** a garden tool with a long handle, used to gather leaves. *Put the rake in the shed.* **b. (rakes, raked, rak•ing)** to use this tool. *Will you help me rake the leaves?*

ran past tense of **run**. *We ran fast.*

rest **a.** the other part; what is left over. *I ate ten nuts, and Mark ate the rest.* **b.** to stop working; to relax. *Rest a minute before you go on.*

rice a grain that people eat. *We ate chicken and rice.*

ride (rides, rode, rid•den, rid•ing)

a. to sit on a moving animal or bicycle. *Can you ride a horse?*

b. to go in a car, bus, or train. *How long does it take to ride to the city?*

rip (rips, ripped, rip•ping) to tear apart. *He may rip his pants on a nail.*

rod a long thin pole of wood, metal, or plastic. *Dad took his fishing rod to the pond.*

room **a.** a closed space inside a building. *Jan walked into the front room.* **b.** extra space. *Leave room on your paper for your name.*

rope a strong cord made by twisting smaller cords together. *We used a rope to hang the swing.*

rose a flower that grows on a bush with thorns. *A rose smells sweet.*

rug a covering for a floor; a carpet. *He has a round rug in his room.*

run (**runs, ran, run, run•ning**) to move quickly; to go faster than walking. *Doug ran to first base.*

rust the coat of red-brown powder that forms on metals when they get damp. *My bike got a spot of rust when I left it outside.*



same just like another; identical. *Do it the same way I do.*

see (**sees, saw, seen, see•ing**) **a.** to look at; to use the eyes. *I can see a truck on the road.* **b.** to find out. *See if she needs any help.*

seed the part of a plant from which another plant grows. *An acorn is the seed of an oak tree.*



seed

set **a.** a group of things that belong together. *A carpenter needs a set of tools.* **b.** (**sets, set, set•ting**) to put in a certain place. *Set the dishes on the table.*

shake (shakes, shook, shak•en, shak•ing) to move quickly up and down or from side to side. *The label says "Shake well before using."*

she that girl or woman. *She likes to read.*

ship **a.** a large boat. *The ship sailed across the sea.* **b. (ships, shipped, ship•ping)** to send by boat, truck, or plane. *Our aunt will ship us a crate of apples.*

shop **a.** a small store. *We have a good hobby shop on our street.* **b. (shops, shopped, shop•ping)** to go to stores to buy things. *I'm going to shop for food.*

show (shows, showed, shown or showed, show•ing) **a.** to point out. *I will go first to show the way.* **b.** a movie, play, or TV program. *We saw a funny show.*

shut (shuts, shut, shut•ting) to close. *Will you shut the door, please?*

side **a.** a line that makes an edge. *Trace that side of the triangle.* **b.** the part between the top and the bottom or between the back and the front. *Use the door at the side of the house.*

sip (sips, sipped, sip•ping) to drink slowly, a little at a time. *I like to sip juice with a straw.*

sit (sits, sat, sit•ting) to rest on the lower part of the body. *I will sit in this big chair.*

skip (skips, skipped, skip•ping) to move quickly by hopping twice on each foot. *The children want to skip around the yard.*

slam (slams, slammed, slam•ming) to shut hard with a loud noise. *The wind made the door slam.*

slip (slips, slipped, slip•ping) to slide suddenly. *Don't slip on the wet sidewalk.*

snap (snaps, snapped, snap•ping) **a.** to make a quick bite. *Look at that fish snap at the bait!* **b.** to break or crack. *I can snap this twig in two.*

snug

snug cozy; comfortable. *Coats keep us snug and warm.*

so **a.** very. *I love you so much.* **b.** in the same way; also. *He is a good helper, and so is his sister.*

sock a short stocking. *A long sock comes up to the knee.*

spin (**spins, spun, spin•ning**) to turn around fast. *Can you see the wheel spin?*

spoon a tool for eating or serving that has a small bowl at one end. *Bring a spoon for the soup, please.*

step (**steps, stepped, step•ping**)

a. a movement of the foot. *Simon says, "Take a big step."* **b.** a small platform for the foot. *I can stand on the top step.* **c.** to lift the foot and put it down in a new place; to walk. *Step to the front of the line.*

stiff not able to bend easily; hard. *My new toothbrush is stiff.*

still **a.** quiet; silent. *The house is very still at night.* **b.** even; yet. *Do you still have that old ball?*

stir (**stirs, stirred, stir•ring**) to move around or mix. *Jessica can stir the oatmeal with a spoon.*

stool a seat with no back or arms. *Please push the stool under the table.*

stove something you cook on. *The stove is hot.*

sun

sun the star that gives us light and heat. *The sun sets in the west.*

sweep (sweeps, swept, sweep•ing) to clean by brushing away. *Sweep up this dirt with a broom.*

tag **a.** a small piece of paper, metal, or plastic that contains information. *Can you read the price tag?* **b.** a game of chase. *Let's play freeze tag.*

take (takes, took, tak•en, tak•ing) **a.** to grip; to hold. *Take my hand when we cross the street.* **b.** to carry. *Can you take this box to the office?*

tide

tame not wild; gentle. *You can pet the tame animals in the children's zoo.*

that (those pl.) the thing or person over there. *Greg sits at that desk by the window.*

the that one or those. *Did you find the pen or the pencils I lost?*

then **a.** at that time. *They came at 2:00, but I was gone then.* **b.** soon after. *We went to the movies, and then we came home.*

thin (thin•er, thin•nest) not thick or fat. *A sheet of paper is thin.*

this (these pl.) the thing or person nearby. *Is this lunch box yours?*

thud a dull sound made when something big falls. *The suitcase fell with a thud.*

thump a loud bumping noise. *Did you hear that thump in the attic?*

tide the regular rise and fall of the water in the sea. *Let's look for seashells at low tide.*

time what a clock shows; the hour and minute. *What time is it?*

tip **a.** the end or point. *Can you touch the tip of your nose?* **b.** (tips, tipped, tip•ing) to lean; to push over. *The milk will spill if you tip the glass.*

to as far as; until; toward. *I'll walk to the corner with you.*

top **a.** the highest part. *A bird sat on the top of the tree.* **b.** a cover or lid. *Put the top on the jar, please.*

trot (trots, trot•ed, trot•ing) to move at a pace between a walk and a run. *A horse can trot or gallop.*

tug (tugs, tugged, tug•ing) to pull hard. *My dog likes to tug on his leash.*

twins two persons born to the same mother at the same time. *The twins Don and Ron look alike.*

up in, at, or to a higher place. *The rocket went up into the sky.*

us we; ourselves; the persons talking. *Play with us!*

use (us•es, used, us•ing) to put into action; to work with. *Jim will use a hammer to hit the nail.*

V

vase a bottle or jar used to hold flowers. *Cindy put the roses in a pretty vase.*



vase

vest a short jacket with no sleeves. *My vest matches my pants.*

vine a plant with a long stem that can twist around things. *Grapes grow on a vine.*

W

wag (wags, wagged, wag•ing) to move from side to side. *My dog likes to wag her tail as she eats.*

wake (wakes, woke or waked, waked or wo•ken, wak•ing) to stop or cause to stop sleeping. *Please wake me at six o'clock.*

was past tense of **is**. *He was sick.*

we us; ourselves; the persons speaking. *We are friends.*

weed an unwanted plant that grows wild. *Weeds grow fast.*

wet not dry. *The paint is still wet.*

wide (wid•er, wid•est) big from side to side. *A street with four lanes is wide.*

wig a covering of false hair for the head. *I'm going to wear a wig.*

wipe (wipes, wiped, wip•ing) to clean or dry by rubbing. *Wipe the dust off the table.*

wish **a.** (wish•es, wished, wish•ing) to want; to hope for. *I wish you could come over.* **b.** something you want or hope for. *Did your wish come true?*

with **a.** in the company of. *They went with Uncle Charles.* **b.** using. *I washed my hands with soap and water.*

woke past tense of **wake**. *The thunder woke us up.*



yes the opposite of **no**. *Yes, you are right.*

yet **a.** up to now. *They haven't come yet.* **b.** still. *They may get here yet.*
