Introduction

Ready to Read and Write is an exciting three-book comprehension series for primary students. The books introduce young learners to a stimulating variety of fiction and non-fiction texts, including letters, cartoon strips, poems, stories, and information texts. Students will encounter interesting and familiar situations and appealing characters. The texts are complemented by colorful and lively illustrations.

Students are introduced to a variety of basic reading skills through a range of carefully written activities. Students will learn skills such as understanding main ideas and details. Students are also encouraged to read between the lines and reach their own conclusions. They will learn to develop basic skills of deduction and inference as well as literal understanding of the text. They are also given the opportunity to respond to the topics in writing and drawing activities.

Each unit is accompanied by a page of Extra Practice activities. These extension exercises cover the same topic and contain the same key vocabulary as the unit. Students can work independently on these pages. The Extra Practice activities can be used for self-study or done in class by students who have completed the unit.

A progress test is provided for every five units to help teachers assess students' comprehension and vocabulary skills.

There was a big thunderstorm in Selby yesterday. Three children from Selby School had a lucky escape during the thunderstorm. They were standing under a tree when it was struck by lightning.

"Three of my friends and I were playing soccer in Selby Park after school," said nine-year-old Mike

Anderson. "We saw the thunderstorm coming. The clouds got darker and darker.


"My friend Hugo went home then. That was the right thing to do! But Cory, Philip, and I kept playing. Then we heard thunder and saw lightning in the sky. It started to rain, so we ran and stood under the big tree at the side of the park.

"Then the tree was struck by lightning. There was a really bright light and a loud 'bang.' We all fell to the ground. Then we heard a loud 'crack.' It was the tree falling over! It all happened very fast. Luckily, the tree didn't fall onto us. No one was hurt. But it was very scary!"

Sergeant Parker, from the Selby Police, said

that the children were very lucky. "It's dangerous to stand under a tree during a thunderstorm," he said. "Lightning often strikes trees. It's best to go inside."

"The next time I'm outside when there's a thunderstorm, I'm going to do what Hugo did," said Mike. "I'm going to go straight home!"




Lightning striking during yesterday's thunderstorm.

Ferdinand Magellan was an explorer. He sailed across the oceans looking for new things and places. In 1519, Magellan decided to sail from Spain to the Spice Islands, on the other side of the world. He left Spain in September 1519 with a crew of 270 men. They had five ships.

First, they sailed across the Atlantic Ocean to South America. Then they sailed south. But the weather got worse and worse. One ship was wrecked. The crew on another ship decided to sail back to Spain. But the other three ships found a way to sail around the bottom of South America. On the other side, they came to another ocean. Magellan called it the Pacific Ocean.

They sailed across the Pacific Ocean for four months. During this time, they ran out of food. Many men became sick. Some men died. At last, in March 1521, they arrived in the Philippines. They got some food and water there. But Magellan was killed by some of the people who lived there.

By this time, there were only 115 men in the crew. They decided to sail back to Spain in two ships. Only one ship arrived back in Spain. It arrived in September 1522 with only 18 men on it. They were the first people to sail around the world! Magellan was not with them. But he is famous because he found a way to sail around the south of South America. This part of the ocean is now called the Straits of Magellan.
